# Introduction

Marks Hall Estate rose to prominence in the Stuart period of English history (1603-1625).

These were volatile times; times of plots and machinations to bring down the monarchy, famously led by Guy Fawkes in 1605. In fact, one owner of Marks Hall Estate, Thomas Honeywood was a leading parliamentarian during the English Civil War.

Literature also took a grim turn in the Jacobean era, with Shakespeare writing some of his darkest plays, including Macbeth and King Lear, and the emergence of metaphysical poets like John Donne.

Today, Marks Hall Estate is still rich with atmosphere and history. From the haunting screeches of bats after nightfall in the woodland, to the eerie site of the lost Jacobean hall with its own chapel and burial ground.

1. **Choose your tone** Decide whether you want to go funny or grim.
2. **Choose your ghost** Do you want your reader to love or fear the ghost? Will you be on the ghost's side or will your hero be the hunter?
3. **Mix it up** We all know the classic ingredients for creating a spooky atmosphere. Of course most of the action takes place at night.
4. **Give your ghost a life story** Decide where your ghosts come from. How many are there?
5. **Set some rules** Yes, even ghosts need them.

6. **Explore themes** Don't forget about The Big Themes! A ghost story is very often about death and guilt, about life unlived, about loss.
7. **Do your research** Do you know that there are ghost hunters?
8. **Create the right writing atmosphere** Write at night, a very easy way to create just the right writing atmosphere!
9. **There's more to a ghost story than ghosts** A ghost story can of course deal with other haunting creatures too.
10. **Ignore the previous nine rules** Break all the rules! Ignore all the advice! Write a ghost story that's in bright daylight. Make it a ghostly robot.
