- **1. Choose your tone** Decide whether you want to go funny or grim.
- **2. Choose your ghost** Do you want your reader to love or fear the ghost? Will you be on the ghost's side or will your hero be the hunter?
- **3. Mix it up** We all know the classic ingredients for creating a spooky atmosphere. Of course most of the action takes place at night.
- **4. Give your ghost a life story** Decide where your ghosts come from. How many are there?
- **5. Set some rules** Yes, even ghosts need them.





- **6. Explore themes** Don't forget about The Big Themes! A ghost story is very often about death and guilt, about life unlived, about loss.
- **7. Do your research** Do you know that there are ghost hunters?
- **8. Create the right writing atmosphere** Write at night, a very easy way to create just the right writing atmosphere!
- **9. There's more to a ghost story than ghosts** A ghost story can of course deal with other haunting creatures too.
- **10. Ignore the previous nine rules** Break all the rules! Ignore all the advice! Write a ghost story that's in bright daylight. Make it a ghostly robot.
